5. ARCW Presentation

Presenter: Maria Huerta

- AIDS Network/ARCW
- ARCW formerly known as AIDS network have been LHC's financial agent for the past 16 years.

- AIDS network
 - Established in 1985 with the mission to offer support, education, and create opportunities for the well being of HIV patients
 - Services
 - Case management; Involvement varies depending on the need
 - Dental
 - HIV testing +walk ins
 - Needle exchange programs- Daily and evening hours available
 - Food pantry twice a month for people who receive case management
 - Attorney services
 - Perform information and referrals
 - Financial assistance
 - RCW -3 months help with rent

- ARCW- Believes in integration of care
 - Services include: Behavioral clinic, pharmacy, social services, medical clinic
 - Organization's future goals:
 - Expand access to care
 - Enhance medical outcomes in Madison
 - Enhance outreach and find resources for people affected with HIV

- Questions:
 - Q: Who can have access to care?
 - A: Insured, uninsured, as well as people who are 300 % below federal poverty line can have access to ARCW services.

 - Q: Do patients have to switch providers?
 - A: Patients can keep their HIV care or switch to ARCW providers

 - Q: Will your medical provider be bilingual, if not, will there be interpreter services available?
 - A: Not sure yet.

 - Suggestion: Culturally competent and preferably bilingual staff would be ideal!

 - Q: Are mental health providers free?
 - A: Insurance plans will be billed when possible or based on FPL

Q: What ages will the clinic serve?

A: Adults. For now thoughts are that children will go to The children's hospital.

Q: What is being done for prevention?

A: Organization is at mercy of state funding and varies depending on risk assessment

-Outreach depends on staff and what the state requires.

-Currently they are working with what is available and trying to reach as many people as possible

- ARCW Statistics:

-352 Latinos affected with HIV -12% of population

-35/352 reside in Madison

Gender: Mostly males

Reports from 2013 state wide:

-HIV infection disproportionately affects racial/ethnic minorities

-10 fold greater among Black males

5 fold greater among Hispanic males compared to white

Risk:

MSM(Men having sex with men) accounted for 90% of new diagnoses among men in 2013

2% were both MSM and drug users

-79% high-risk heterosexual contact and 21% injection drug use among women in 2013
